## Annual Banquet Celebrates 15 Years

## Alaska Natives invited to hear Navajo leader

Peter MacDonald, Chairman of the Navajo Tribal Council, will be the keynote speaker for the 15th Anniversary Banquet of the Tundra Times. The banquet will be held in the Discovery Ballroom of the Captain Cook Hotel in Anchorage, at 8:00 p.m. the evening of November 12.

MacDonald, an internationally reknowned American Indian leader, is tribal chairman of the most populous Indian tribe in the United States. He will speak on a topic related to this year's

theme for the Alaska Federation of Natives convention, "Does one way of life have to die so that another may live?"

The forty-eight year-old Navajo has been tribal chairman since 1971, when he relinquished a successful career as an aircraft engineer to enter tribal service.

When he resigned the job of project engineer with Hughes Aircraft to serve as executive director of the Office of Nava-jo Economic Opportunity and to seek tribal chairmanship, MacDonald explained, "I do not regret the decision I made. Success is not money. It is not position. It is education and awareness so that you can see and recognize the means to develop your character and enrich this by serving other than your own narrow self-interest."

Raised in a traditional Navajo community, MacDonald experienced problems of poverty and an alien education system similar to those still faced by many rural Alaska families. He dropped out of school out of frustration and a feeling of inferiority.

MacDonald overcame the problems and frustrations to return to school, each a college degree, and pursue a successful career in aircraft engineering.

The articulate Indian was born in Teecnospos, Arizona on December 16, 1928. He is a combat veteran of World War II, having seen service in the Marine Corps in the Pacific and China.
