Attention Asked of All Non-profit Businesses

ATTENTION ALL NON-PROFIT CORPORATIONS IN ALASKA— the Commissioner of Commerce, George Sharrock wishes to bring to your attention the requirements of the new non-profit corporation act that was enacted in the 1968 session of the legislature and became effective July 1, 1968.

Under the new law it is now necessary for all non-profit corporations to appoint and continuously maintain in the State a registered office and agent.

The registered agent may be either an individual resident of the state or a domestic or foreign corporation authorized to transact business in the state whose business office is the same as the registered office.

Also, it will now be required that each non-profit corporation file an annual report. The report consists of advising the Department of Commerce as to the current registered agent and office, the activities in which the corporation is engaged, and the current officers and directors, etc.

It is to be filed between January 1 and March 1 of each year, unless the corporation is on a fiscal year rather than calendar year and then the report is due within sixty days after the close of the corporation's fiscal year. The forms for filing the reports are furnished by the Department of Commerce.

Under the prior statute non-profit corporations were not required to advise the Department of Commerce of their mailing address, thus it is impossible for the Department to advise individually each of the some 1,200 non-profit corporations now on file of the new requirements.

Therefore, the Department must ask all non-profit corporations to contact the Department of Commerce, Corporation Section, Pouch "D", Juneau, Alaska, 99801 for information and forms for meeting new requirements.

It should be pointed out that failure to comply with the above mentioned requirements constitute grounds for involuntary dissolution of the corporation.

port only from 15, and many of the interviewers stated that several of those favoring Gruening in the race also said they would not vote for him in any case.

Moore compared Gruening's rating of 15% in Anchorage with the Senator's rating of 25% in the four-way primary race concluded just last August 27. "The Senator has lost substantial support by indicating he will not abide by the decision of the voters," said Moore. "This is plainly a simple question of majority rule, and everyone should admit it."

Moore, who is a local radio broadcaster, also said that his pollsters had indicated that of the 15 voting for Gruening to re-enter the race, some were Republicans interested in seeing

Gruening draw votes away from Mike Gravel, thus enhancing the chances of Elmer Rasmuson, a Republican.

"Along with most other Democrats, young and old," Moore said, "I have felt that Senator Gruening's re-entry into the race would be unfair and harmful. This poll has reinforced that thinking, and I hope it will encourage Senator Gruening to withdraw his name from further consideration."

Construction of Post Office at Aniak Approved

Postmaster General Marvin Watson recently advised Senator Gruening that the Department has approved construction of a new post office for Aniak, Alaska.

Bid calls are expected shortly.

Now Nine—

RACAP Approves Regional Centers

The board of directors of Rural Alaska Community Action Program gave approval last week to the establishment of regional action centers in Copper Valley, Tanana, Ft. Yukon and St. Mary's, bringing to nine the number of such community centers.

Meeting in Anchorage Sept. 12, the board also adopted a resolution urging the governor of Alaska to activate a council to coordinate state, federal and private agencies, especially those agencies working toward the elimination of poverty.

The board indicated a willingness to cooperate with such a coordinating council.

Hugh Nicholls, deputy director for the Community Service Corps, recommended the four new sites for action centers and sought immediate initiation of the center in Copper Center since the building there is already available.

The action centers are part of the \$861,000 Community Service Corps. The program calls for establishment of 10 regional action centers in key, target areas of the state to promote coordinated social and economic development in those areas.

The five centers established earlier this year were in Nome, Kodiak, Bethel, Kotzebue and Juneau. The centers are responsible for carrying out many of the anti-poverty programs for their areas. All of the centers serve as job banks and information centers.

Special projects at the centers include a skin-sewing class at Nome, a child care center in Kodiak, a pre-maternal home in Bethel, a family repair shop under development in Kotzebue and a half-way house in Juneau.

Junior Ramos, area community developer representing

the Community Service Corps to the board, said the centers would be established in Tanana in October and November and in St. Mary's and Ft. Yukon in November and December.

In other action during the Sept. 12 meeting, the board adopted four general priorities to establish direction for the action agency's programming: manpower training and job development; child development and child care; community organization and development; and development and adjustment of rural youth.

Job development will include such programs as Operation Mainstream, New Careers, Work Experience, Job Corps, Manpower Development and Training, On-the-job training, basic adult education and high school equivalency programs.

Programs will also stress job development through economic development of the areas.

Child development includes such projects as Head Start, parent and child care centers, day care centers and all other programs aimed at helping disadvantaged children.

Community organization and development is being achieved primarily through the community action centers under the Community Service Corps.

The board has tentatively set their next meeting, the annual meeting of the board, for Sept. 23-25 at Sitka.
