Laura to Lead Eskimo-Indian Olympics Performers at Folk Life

Unofficial liskimo ambassadress Laura Bergt and four top
Eskimo and Indian athletes will
demonstrate Native games at the
8th Annual Festival of American
Folk Life in Washington, D.C.
July 1-15 sponsored by the
Smithsonian Institute, a nonprofit organization.

The four Natives were top winners in last year's Eskimo Olympics. They and Laura also made a guest appearance on Johnny Carson's Tonight Show

and presented the surprised host with an oosik. In the hilarious episode, an embarressed Laura explained to Carson the oosik was not a walrus tusk but a male reproductive organ.

The four are Roger Kunuyak formerly of Diomede now of Fairbanks, Reggie Joule of Kotzebue, Lester Bodfish of Wainwright, and Fred Titus of Minto.

Joule won the two-foot high kick with a distance of six feet eight inches last year. He also

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won the nalukutuk (blanket
toss) in the men's competition.

Bodfish had won the one foot

high kick.

The Native athletes will also demonstrate the Indian stick pull, drop the bomb, the ear pulling contest, the ear weight contest, the knuckle hop and possibly some dances.

Laura will also demonstrate the blanket toss and will emcee

the group's demonstration.

The festival is visited by over one and a halt million people every year. The Institute will also have their own video tape crew and two photographers re-

cording the festival.

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According to Laura, National Public Radio which has over 160 affiliates, the British Broadcasting Company, private and network film makers will also be presenting both live and on tape to many other millions not attending the festival.

The Natives have heard of a possible invitation from CBS

after the festival.

Laura is also taking with her some Point Hope ice to Sen. James Buckley, who had recently been on a whaling adventure with her at Point Hope.

The ice is for their "Bowhead Mist," with a recipe including scotch and water and Point Hope ice concocted while resting

during the hunt.
