Hickel was exuberant Friday at the report . . . It was his order to withdraw the land for leasing in the face of the Interior Department's land freeze. And last spring at the drilling site he had the optimism to predict just such a strike.

Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel, addressing a large crowd at a Lincoln Day dinner at the Denver Hilton Hotel Wednesday night, said he has dedicated himself to giving the highest priority "to improving the total environment in which we live."

"They say that people will be watching me more closely than any other Cabinet member now. Well, I'll be watching them, too . . .
