A Book Review-

Native American's Rights Under Laws

The Civil Rights Commission performed—a real service in gathering together the pertinent information—on Native American's rights under Federal and Iribal laws. Part of the text does not apply to resident Alaskans since it is intended for Indians living on reservations.

In 1968, Congress passed an act known as "The Indian Bill of Rights" which extended to reservation residents the same civil rights and liberties in relation to tribal authorities that the Federal Constitution guarantees to all persons in relationship to Federal and State authorities.

The first section explains the basic freedoms of belief and expression. The second part deals with the rights of an accuracy person and the "due process of the law".

Simple explanations of one's rights such as the right to a trail by jury, the right to be pro-

tected from excessive fines and cruel and unusual punishments are of special importance to people living in urban areas.

The final portion deals principally with discrimination in housing, employment and education and what an individual can do about them

Perhaps the host practical part of the handbook is a directory on the process of where, how, and to whom one should file complaints. Names and addresses of various agencies in each State are provided.

This time little handbook ninety-six pages long—should be in the files of each village council, and in the hands of many individuals. It is written in such a way that the average person with a grade school or high school education can understand it.

It might be a good idea for each village council or regional corporation to provide copies for many of the people.
