university's Board of Regents. Hearst, chairman of the executive committee of the Hearst Corp. and editor-in-chief of the Hearst Newspapers, is being honored for his long, distinguished career in journalism and for aiding Alaska in its struggle for political and economic development.

More specifically, Hearst is being recognized for his strong, sustained support of the Alaskan statehood cause and for his recent efforts to persuade the American people to support the trans-Alaska oil pipeline, which, he argued is essential to the national welfare and can be built with minimal environmental damage.

Hearst began his journalistic career as a reporter for the New York American in 1928. He worked through the ranks to become publisher of that newspaper in 1936-37. He subsequently served as publisher of the New York Journal-American from 1937-56.

Hearst was a war correspondent from 1943-45 and won the Pulitzer Prize in 1956 for his reporting on Soviet affairs and the Overseas Press Club Award in 1958 for foreign reporting.

He is a member of the board of directors of 20th Century Fox, San Luis Mining Co., United Press International, and the Inter-American Press Association.

Sarnoff, chairman of the

board and chief executive officer of RCA, is being honored by the University of Alaska for his significant contributions to broadcasting and the science and technology of communications.

Before moving to the presidency of RCA in 1966, he was a top executive with its subsidiary, the National Broadcasting Co., serving three years as president, then more than seven as NBC board chairman. Throughout the 10-year period, he also served as NBC's chief executive officer.

Three years ago, Sarnoff authorized RCA's purchase of the Air Force's Alaska Communications (Alascom) to assume the task of providing communications in the state.

Since then, these communications have undergone substantial upgrading through construction of satellite ground facilities and microwave systems and establishment of direct, long-distance dialing.

Before joining NBC, Sarnoff was a member of the Look magazine staff in New York and assistant to the publisher of the Des Moines (Iowa) Register and Tribune. During World War II he was a naval officer, serving first under the Chief of Naval Operations and then under Adm. William F. Halsey in the Pacific for two years.

Rock the highly respected editor of the "Tundra Times," is being honored by the university for his unceasing efforts to promote the welfare of the native peoples of Alaska and understanding among all peoples. He founded the newspaper on Oct. 1, 1962 at the urging of friends who impressed upon him the need for a publication that would present the native view.

Through the "Tundra Times" Rock encouraged the political

organization of the native people and pressed continuously for settlement of their long-standing land claims, a goal finally achieved in 1971. Friendly persuasion rather than militancy has marked his journalistic efforts.

The son of an Eskimo whaling captain, Rock was born at Point Hope. He early learned the traditional skills of the hunter, but the desire to develop his considerable artistic talent led him from the village at an early age.

Upon graduation from the government school at White Mountain — where a teacher encouraged him to paint — he went to Oregon and then Washington to study art. Then he began a career in Seattle hand-crafting art objects, a career that continued until 1961, interrupted only by World War II service as a U.S. Army Air Force radio operator. It was during a visit to Point Hope in 1961 that he learned of the need for a newspaper with a native viewpoint.

Rivers, now living in retirement in Chehalis, Washington, is being honored by the university for long and distinguished service on behalf of his fellow Alaskans and for his exceptional contributions to the cause of statehood.

He was admitted to the Alaska Bar in 1931 and began the practice of law at Fairbanks that same year. Two years later he accepted appointment as U.S. attorney in that community for the Fourth Judicial Division.

In subsequent years he served as territorial attorney general, chairman of the Alaska Employment Security Commission, mayor of Fairbanks, and president of the League of Alaskan Cities.

As chairman of the Territorial Senate's Judiciary Committee in 1955, Rivers helped to draft legislation authorizing the Alaska Constitution Convention of 1955-56. He sought and won a seat at that convention and was elected its second vice president.

Voters of the Territory sent him to Washington in 1956 as a member of the Alaska-Tennessee Plan delegation to lobby for statehood. Two years later they elected him their first congressman, and they reelected him three times.

Commager, professor of history at Amherst College, is one of the nation's most distinguished historians. An outstanding scholar, master teacher and prolific writer, he is noted for the wide range of his interests and commentary, and his penetrating analysis of American character, society and politics.

Commager has lectured in most states of the Union, several European countries, and Israel and Chile. He has served as Pitt Professor of American history at Cambridge University and as Harnsworth Professor of American History at Oxford University.

With Samuel Eliot Morison he wrote a classic study of American history, "The Growth of the 'American Republic.'" His two-volume "Documents of American History," is a basic reference for historians. His study of the development of American character, "The American Mind," has been called a landmark of intellectual history.

Though retired, Commager continues to teach and write at Amherst, and to travel the nation lecturing on constitutional history and the nature of American society.

Sealed bids in single copy for furnishing all labor, materials and equipment, and performing all work on Project FH-10-2(3), Miller Creek to Dangerous River described herein, will be received until 2:00 p.m. prevailing time, May 30, 1974 in the Commissioner's Office, Department of Highways, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska.

This project will consist of grading and drainage on 3.3 miles of Forest Highway and construction of a three span bridge across Dangerous River. The project is located near Yakutat, Alaska.

Principal items of work consist of the following: 340 cubic yards of Class I excavation for structures; 94 cubic yards of Class 5 concrete; approximately 386 cubic yards of Class A concrete, lump sum, all required; approximately 21,000 pounds of reinforcing steel and 64,000 pounds of structural steel, lump sum, all required; the superstructure of the Dangerous River Bridge will be designed by the Contractor or conform to a panel-type of standard manufacture and be paid for as a lump sum item, all required; the roadway construction will be a lump sum, all required.

All work shall be completed in 270 Calendar days.
