

Don Wright Still Asserts He's Duly Elected AFN President

Don Wright, filing suit in Anchorage, asserts that he is still the "duly-elected President, lawfully chosen by the vote of delegates and members in convention assembled, of the ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES, an unincorporated association."

Wright also claims to be still the duly elected President and Chief Executive Officer of the defendant, ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES, INC.

Wright makes strong charges against those he called "usurpers" - John Borbridge, Willie Hensley, Mike Swetozof, Cecil Barnes, Nels Anderson, Al Nakak, Martin Olson, Harry E. Carter and attorney Barry W. Jackson.

Wright charges his opposition with being bent upon "the immediate creation of a highly salaried bureaucracy of creating for themselves and their supporters well paying jobs, emoluments and expense accounts, and otherwise embark on a campaign of self-aggrandizement and self-enrichment, contrary to the best interests of the Association and of the Native Indian, Eskimo and Aleut people of Alaska."

Wright makes reference to loans made by various Indian organizations, Tyonek Village and the Yakima Indian Nation, in the approximate total amount, of \$325,000 (plus interest).

Wright states that he and his "loyalist supporters" insisted that the AFN, Inc. make an immediate effort to collect financial commitments from its

constituent regional corporations, to conduct (and review the results of) a professional audit, and based thereon, proceed FIRST, to pay back the accumulated loans from Indian organizations."

The "dissident directors" named by Wright were, according to him opposed to his views on this matter, and thereby organized the "rump" meeting in Anchorage the week of Sept. 23, 1972, in place of attending the regularly scheduled meeting planned by Wright for Wildwood at that same time.

Wright also filed a complaint charging the same defendants with forcible entry and detainer. He claims for the unincorpora-

ted ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES a "leasehold interest" in the premises of certain space in the South Kaloa Building situated at 1675 "C" Street in Anchorage.

He claims that the defendants "willfully, unlawfully, forcibly, and without authority or color of right, entered upon said premises and took possession of them."

Wright claims ALASKA FEDERATION OF NATIVES, unincorporated, is the owner of "the books, records, documents, files, papers, equipment, furniture, furnishings, supplies, paraphernalia, utilities, facilities and other items" at that address, and asks for the return of these items or for damages for the "wrongful detention thereof."

Wright claims that the actions

of the "usurpers" were wholly unauthorized and without legal or corporate authority, citing State law.

He is seeking to restrain the present AFN, Inc. board from disposing of any funds or assets of the corporation and from "obstructing ... the duly called convention of the Association" called for Dec. 14-18 at Wildwood.

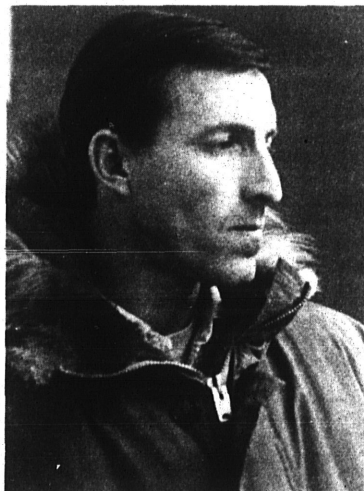

He was a deputy director of the U.S. Economic Mission to Peru (agency for international development).

He has been an administrative assistant to a U.S. Senator and his state campaign manager. He has been a professor and department head of a college as well as a high school teacher.

He received his A.B. degree in economics from the University of Texas at Austin, and A.B. in education from California State College, his M.A. in economics at the University of Southern California and his Ph.D. in history, philosophy and education from the University of Texas.

This year in May, Dr. Boren testified before a U.S. Senate committee in the following manner:

"... What this nation needs today is not less paper ... paper that can blanket the earth in comforting protection against those activists who would bring about change and unsettling progress.

"We need not fewer but more government forms, because we, the bureaucrats, cannot serve the taxpayers unless we demand that they tell us all there is to know about their business.

"And finally Mr. Chairman, we need an abundant supply of red tape to serve as the majestic threads that can bind our nation into a single harmonic unit. ..."

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
