# New Teachers size up Grayling and Grayling sizes up new teachers

Three teachers, new to Grayling, Kris Minelga, Mark Leamy and Beth Hughes, arrived at the beginning of the school year to add their particular specialities to the educational curriculum of the high school and the Grayling Day School.

Kris has taken on the position of principal/teacher at the Iditarod High School. She is originally from Olympia, Washington and graduated from Seattle Pa-

cific College. After graduation she worked for Nordstrom for two years. She later substituted in the Anchorage School District and taught summer school at McLaughlin Youth Center in Anchorage. At present, and in addition to her duties as principal, she teaches math, science, arts and crafts, guitar, home economics, photography and computers.

Before arriving in Grayling, he taught for the Fairbanks School District where he substituted while taking courses at the University of Alaska.

Mark's duties at Grayling will include teaching English, American History, government, P.E., and typing. He stated that he was looking forward to moving into the new high school, now under construction, and getting a more diversified athletic program set up. Hopefully, the program will include basketball, volleyball and possibly wrestling, as team sports. He also hopes to incorporate badminton, weight lifting, gymnastics, floor hockey and cross-country skiing into the athletic program.

On Grayling, Mark commented: "This is the most

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picturesque place I have lived and I'm looking forward to exploring around a little bit once snow-go weather arrives." He added, "I'm really pleased with the students attitude toward school as well as with the level of their academic skills. With the completion of the new school, we should be able to offer a first rate secondary program in Grayling."
