Joseph Upicksoun, president of the Arctic Slope Regional Corp., has been elected chairman of the President's Advis Council on Indian Education. Advisory

The council was created by the Education Amendments of 1972 to the Higher Education

Upicksoun, a member of the orth Slope Borough School North Slope Borough School Board, was sponsored by the North Slope Borough School District to the Council.

He heads a group of 15 educators from around the country who are charged with advising the U.S. Commissioner of Education on administration of education programs from of education programs from which Native Americans may benefit.

The group is also to review and make recommendation concerning grant applications to provide technical assistance to local education agencies and Indian education agencies, institutions and organizations to assist them improving the education of Indian children.

The presentation was made at a luncheon in Anchorage also attended by Dr. Louis Whitmore, director of student services at the University of Alaska, Anchorage; Robert Johnson of Anchorage, a partner in the accounting firm; native leader Emil Notti, and others with an interest in the training of natives as accountants.

Fink wrote in a letter of appreciation to Harrington:
... With the Native Land Claims Settlement and the con-

struction of the oil pipeline, when it materializes, the need

for native Americans trained in accounting has become a dire necessity. Also, the native Americans must have the educational opportunity to acquire adequate skills so that they can compete for jobs in accounting

in areas other than rural Alaska.
