Steelers, Cowboys advance to Super Bowl

Houston at Pittsburgh — The Pittsburgh Steelers took their initial possession of the football and drove for a touchdown and never looked back as the Steelers romped to an easy 34-5 victory over the Houston Oilers. The game was really decided with less than a minute to go in the second quarter when the Steelers blitzed Houston for

17 points to open up a 31-3 halftime lead.

Steeler QB Terry Bradshaw survived icy and wet playing conditions to pass for 200 yards and two touchdowns in leading the Steelers offense. However, it was the Steeler defense that forced six fumbles, four of which were recovered by Pitts-

burgh, five interceptions, and holding Earl Campbell to 62 yards rushing that highlighted the victory. Although the game was played in a downpour, Houston QB Dan Pastorini said, "Pittsburgh beat us, not the weather."

Pittsburgh will face the NFC Champion Dallas Cowboys on

January 21 in the Super Bowl.

Dallas at Los Angeles — The Dallas Cowboys were showing a little defense of their own as the Cowboys embarrassed the LA Rams 28-0 to gain a spot in the Super Bowl. The Cowboys defense which forced seven turnovers, capitalized on four of them to score touchdowns. Safety Charlie Waters set up the first two touchdowns with interceptions, returning the first to the Ram nine yard line and the second interception to the Ram

Tony Dorsett rushed for 101 yards and Roger Staubach completed 13 of 25 passes for 126 yards and two touchdowns and then there was defensive tackle Randy White who knocked out two thirds of the Ram backfield with good, hard clean tackles. Ram running back John Cappelletti left in the first quarter with a separated shoulder and QB Pat Haden left in the third quarter with a compound fracture of the right thumb.
