New name for Minto

The new village, to be located on the Tolovana River, twenty miles north from the present site, will probably be called, "CHICHALYU."

Former Chief Richard Frank and Howard Rock, editor of the Tundra Times, worked the spelling of the word out to follow the sounds.

"Chichalvu" means "the back fin of the fish."

Although Minto villagers seem to favor the name Chichalyu, they are still thinking of other names.

AFN reps to ask Hickel to retain land freeze

A four-member team representing the Alaska Federation of Natives is in Washington, D.C., today and plans to ask Interior Secretary-designee Walter J. Hickel to retain the "land freeze" imposed by outgoing Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall.

Emil Notti, president of the AFN said that if he and three other AFN representatives could not get Hickel to agree to retain the land freeze, they would attempt to get an acceptable alternative for protection of native land should the freeze be lifted.

In exchange for granting the request, the AFN is prepared to endorse Hickel for the Interior cabinet post.
