## BBNC Works to Acquire Peter Pan Stock

Bristol Bay Native Corporation of Dillingham, Alaska, is negotiating to acquire the capital stock of Peter Pan Seafoods, Inc., of Seattle, Washington.

A preliminary agreement has been reached leading to a final agreement depending on completion of certain studies being made by both companies.

Peter Pan is a Washington corporation engaged in the capture, processing, canning and marketing of salmon and other marine products. It owns and operates cannery properties in Alaska, including the Bristol Bay region, which constitute its principal processing and packing facilities.

However, it also conducts substantial salmon fishing operations in the Puget Sound area in Washington State, and operates a canning facility in Bellingham on premises leased from the Port of Bellingham.

It also owns properties in the vicinities of Astoria, Oregon, and Coos Bay, Oregon, which it formerly operated in connection with its business and a shipyard facility on the Duwamish River in Seattle, Wash., which is used for the maintenance and winter storage of vessels of the fleet.

Bristol Bay Native Corporation is one of the 12 Alaska Native regional corporations created under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act. Bristol Bay is known world wide as the principal producer of red salmon.

Aside from its interest in becoming involved in the fish processing industry, BBNC's lands are being explored for petroleum through a contract with Phillips Petroleum Co., and for minerals through a contract with Bear Creek Mining Company, a wholly owned subsidiary of Keunecott Copper Corporation.

Other diversified areas of investment are also being studied in an attempt to diversify the corporation's activities.

## Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on 1st Bridge Across Yukon

About 30 people were on hand to witness the cutting of the ceremonial ribbon, by Walter B. Parker, Commissioner of Highways for the State of Alaska; that will open the Yukon River Bridge to Alyeska related traffic starting next week.

Previously the only crossing of the Yukon was by hovercraft, barges or the ice bridge.

The \$32 million bridge has been under construction for approximately two years.

"I would like to compliment the contractors, Manson Osberg and Ghemin, for their efforts in being able to have the bridge available prior to freeze-up which was of course critical to the successful keeping of the pipeline schedule," Parker stated.

He went on to say that "for the first time surface access without impediment other than those occasionally offered by nature will flow for the Gulf Coast of Alaska to the Arctic Ocean, from Keywest at the Southeastern corner of the nation to Prudhoe Bay on the far northern frontiers."

Woodrow Johansen, Interior District Engineer stated that "it was alot of fun, but I wouldn't want to do it again."

Parker complimented Johansen and his engineers and staff for their effort they have made on the bridge.

For now the bridge will be open

only to that traffic which is authorized to use the Yukon to Prudhoe Bay Haul Road. Public traffic will be restricted at the

south end of the bridge until the haul road is taken over by the Department of Highways and operated as a public highway.

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## To Meet Deadline— File for Land

December 18 is the deadline for the Regional Corporations, Native Groups, and Natives residing in Kenai, Kodiak, Sitka and Juneau to file their applications for the land ownership with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

Regional Corporations must also file for a title to existing cemetery sites and historical places by this date. As of mid-August slightly over 10 million acres had been filed for by Regional Corporations.

In addition to these groups Village Corporations must have their applications in for "relocated lands." These lands represent the difference between 22 million entitlements for village corporations provided for in the Alaska Native Land Claims Settlement Act, and the amount the villages are entitled to because of population.

Village Corporations were required to file their original selections before Dec. 18, 1974.

After Dec. 18, only lands actually selected by Alaska Natives will remain withdrawn and segregated for their possible future ownership.

All unselected lands automatically are classified for retention in the public interest. These lands are referred to as D1 lands.

Many Native corporations have filed for more land than they are entitled to, or over selected additional lands in the future. These will also revert to D1 status.

The next stop for BLM will be adjudication of the land selections to make sure that all regulations are met. An interim conveyance can be granted which provides all rights of ownership pending survey of the land, at

which time a patent will be issued.
