from the sea!

There are nice outdoor bleached pieces of wood, small and all shapes all on the sea shore. We can just gather them for wood stoves.

Women use them to boil meats outdoors a lot, in my childhood days.

for keeping the fire going.

All around on the shore of the island there is wood, some places a mile or longer or shorter — like a forest, only not standing, sideways.

People even build houses and many things with this wood that drifts in

from the sea.
