Also include the 1855 treaty, law, which the U.S. government guarantees all Native Americans the right to hunt on all "open and unclaimed land's," including national parks.

And also work closely with United Tribe's of Alaska and Thomas Berger and his staff to have a positive input on the issue's at hand.
