A hearing of public record will be conducted to hear and record testimony concerning the disposition of judgement funds awarded to the Angoon Indians by the Indian Claims Commission in Docket No. 278-B. This notice is given pursuant to the Act of October 19, 1973 (Public Law 93-134; 84Stat. 466, 467 and 468), and Title 25 of the Code of Federal Requaltions, Part 60.

The hearing is scheduled to be held at the Angoon Town Hall, Alaska, on September 27, 1974, beginning at 7:00 p.m. The Hearing Officer is William E. Spear, of Juneau,

All Angoon Indians are invited to attend, but in lieu of actual attendance or in addition to attendance, written comments, suggestions, or objections to the tribe's proposed plan for the use of these judgement funds, may be submitted to the Area Director, Juneau Area Office, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Juneau, Alaska 99801. Written comments should be submitted by September 27, 1974 but will be accepted and considered if postmarked no later than September 30, 1974.
