### 2ND PUBLIC NOTICE DERRING SNOWMOBILE SHOP

The Economic Development Administration of the U.S. Department of Commerce caused a notice to be published on September 19 in this paper, indicating that the agency was considering funding the construction of a shop building for snowmobile and other engine repair in Deering, Alaska. Funding would be through the Mauneluk Native Village Association. The notice indicated that the project is subject to inundation by storm waves off Kotzebue Sound; and that, therefore, in accord with Executive Orders on Floodplain Management, EDA would be attempting to identify alternative sites with lesser floodplain impacts and that EDA invited comments from the public. In the thirty days since pub-

lication of that notice, EDA has received no comments from the public.

The entire Village of Deering is located on a gravel bar across the mouth of the Innachuk River estuary and is subject to stormwave flooding. Thus, there is no site within the village that would be out of the flood plain. Higher ground with bedrock near the surface is located east of the village; but is inaccessible as it is across the Innachuk River. Land to the south and west of the village is low, subject to flooding, is wetland, and is underlain with permafrost and is, therefore, not considered a practicable alternative. While there is some land further to the west that is high enough to be safe from flooding and is not underlain by permafrost, it was the opinion of the Alaska EDR that travel between these sites and the village would constitute a hazard to life during severe winter weather. Therefore, these further sites were considered impracticable.

It was not felt that the proposed EDA project (\$66,000) or its impacts were on a scale that would warrant consideration of relocation of the village.

The snowmobile is the main form of local and intervillage transportation for the residents of Deering during the winter. They are also used in management of the village reindeer herd. There is presently no sheltered location for repairing snowmobiles in Deering. Repairs are carried out in residences creating a fire hazard as well as inconvenience. Lack of maintenance heightens the likelihood of breakdown away from the village, a life threatening situation in severe winter weather. For these reasons the repair facility is felt to be needed and the alternative of not funding the project judged to be not practicable.

EDA has, therefore, concluded that construction of the project on the originally proposed in-village site is the practicable alternative that minimizes impacts on floodplains values and functions.

To further reduce impacts to floodplain values and functions, EDA will require the following mitigative measures:

- 1) That, in conjunction with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the high water mark of record for Deering be determined;
- 2) That the shop building be constructed on piling so that the floor is at least two feet above the high water mark of record; and that the floor structure be attached to the piling in such a way as to resist lifting by storm wave action;
- 3) That a plaque indicating the elevation of the high water mark of record be affixed to the piling supporting the shop building in a readily visible location.

These mitigative measures will, to the extent practicable, avoid damage to or loss of the federal investment and its benefits from storm wave action.

Two aspects of EDA's review of this project, determination of its potential to impact archaeological resources and, through an Alaska Coastal Management Program Consistency Determination, its potential for impact on the coastal zone, are not yet complete. While EDA gives notice that it has determined, based on a review of alternative sites and the floodplain impacts of the proposal, the agency may alter the manner in which it proceeds with this project based upon the outcome of the review of the project's archaeological impacts and the Alaska Coastal Management Program Consistency Determination.

It is expected that the project can be completed in three months from the initiation of construction. Final EDA approval of the project came 15 days from this notice, upon completion of the archaeological review, or upon completion of the Coastal Management Program Consistency Determination, whichever is later. Construction could commence at that time, but might be delayed until summer by ground and weather conditions.
