

Would Encourage Industry— **Harbor Study Fund Asked for St. Paul**

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Howard W. Pollock has asked the Corps of Engineers to request an allocation in the FY 1972 budget to permit a feasibility study for construction of a small boat harbor on St. Paul Island, Alaska.

In a letter to Colonel Kenneth McIntyre of the Corps of Engineers Pacific Division, the Congressman stressed the economic necessity to the local residents of establishing a winter industry.

"If a small boat harbor were constructed, a king crab industry

and/or other types of industry could be established on St. Paul," Pollock said.

Pollock noted that former Senator Bob Bartlett had been successful in obtaining Congressional authorization for a more extensive feasibility study, but the necessary funds must be appropriated.

"If the Corps of Engineers would submit a formal request for funding, this would greatly enhance the chance of obtaining a Congressional appropriation," the Congressman concluded.
