Patrick Robert Neucklavok, 70, died March 2 at the Alaska Native Medical Center.

Mr. Neucklavok, a longshoreman and Bristol Bay commercial fisherman, was born July 12, 1919, in Port Moller. Recently, he had lived in Anchorage, where he mended nets. His hobbies were crossword puzzles, hunting and fishing.
