Sen. Geo. Murphy Addresses GOP Gathering at UA

"We are in serious trouble, my friends," Sen. George Murphy, R-Calif., told an audience of Republicans and other interested Alaskans at a dinner Saturday night in the University Commons.

Senator Murphy was referring to the 10 per cent income tax surcharge which he called the "greatest bureaucratic boondoggle ever" and said that instead of reducing federal spending it added people to the payroll.

to rise and the value of the dollar continues to diminish," he said, charging that even the government programs to help alleviate poverty were ineffective-in spite of his efforts. "I spent four years trying to get the war on poverty to the poor people," he added, but claimed he was not succeeding.

Sharing the platform with Senator Murphy was Elmer Ras-muson, Republican candidate for Senator from Alaska. Also speak-ing briefly was Congressman Pollock who served as master of

ceremonies.

Each Republican candidate for state office was introduced and made brief remarks.

The keynote speaker, Senator Murphy, also touched on the Vietnam war. He said that the United States is there for our own best interests-but that the war has not been won because the military men have not been given a chance.

Whether to bomb or not to bomb," he said, "is an important question-but not the only one." He insisted that the Demo-

cratic administration has used this question to cover up the "mess that is in Washington," referring to the budget which he claimed is 25 billion out of balance. "One day," he conclud-ed, "somebody must balance those books."

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
