Vessels in the system's Southeastern segment led the way in increasing the volume of traffic, Easley said transporting 24,000 more people and 5,000 more vehicles.

sioner added that preliminary figures indicate this summer's volumes are up at least 5 per cent over the 1973 increases.

Easley said that with two new vessels scheduled to enter Alaska Marine Highway service next year, "continued increases are projected in both volume of traffic and in earned revenues."

The \$1.3 million Public Works Department project, won by South Coast Forest Products Company, Petersburg, was begun in July 1972



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
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
