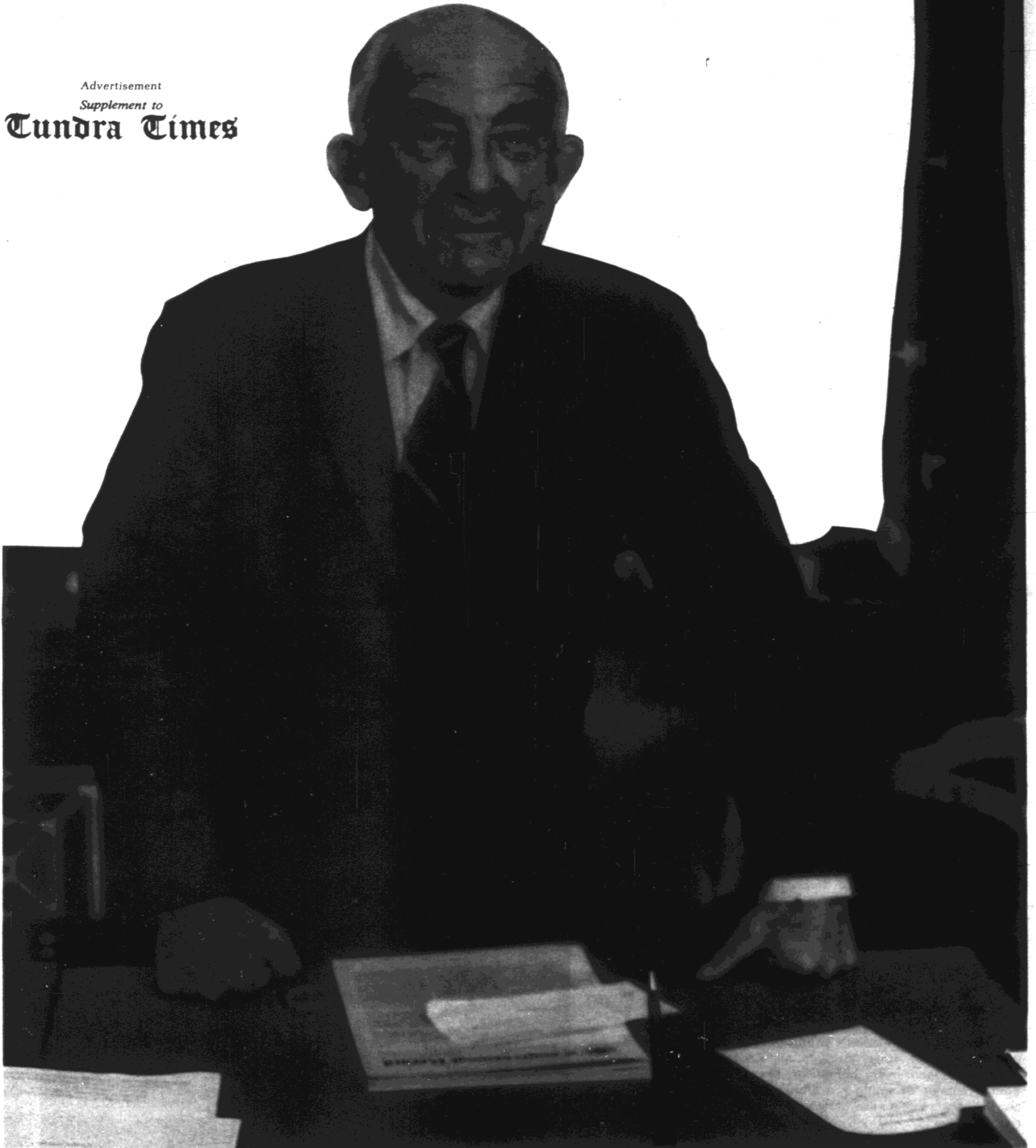

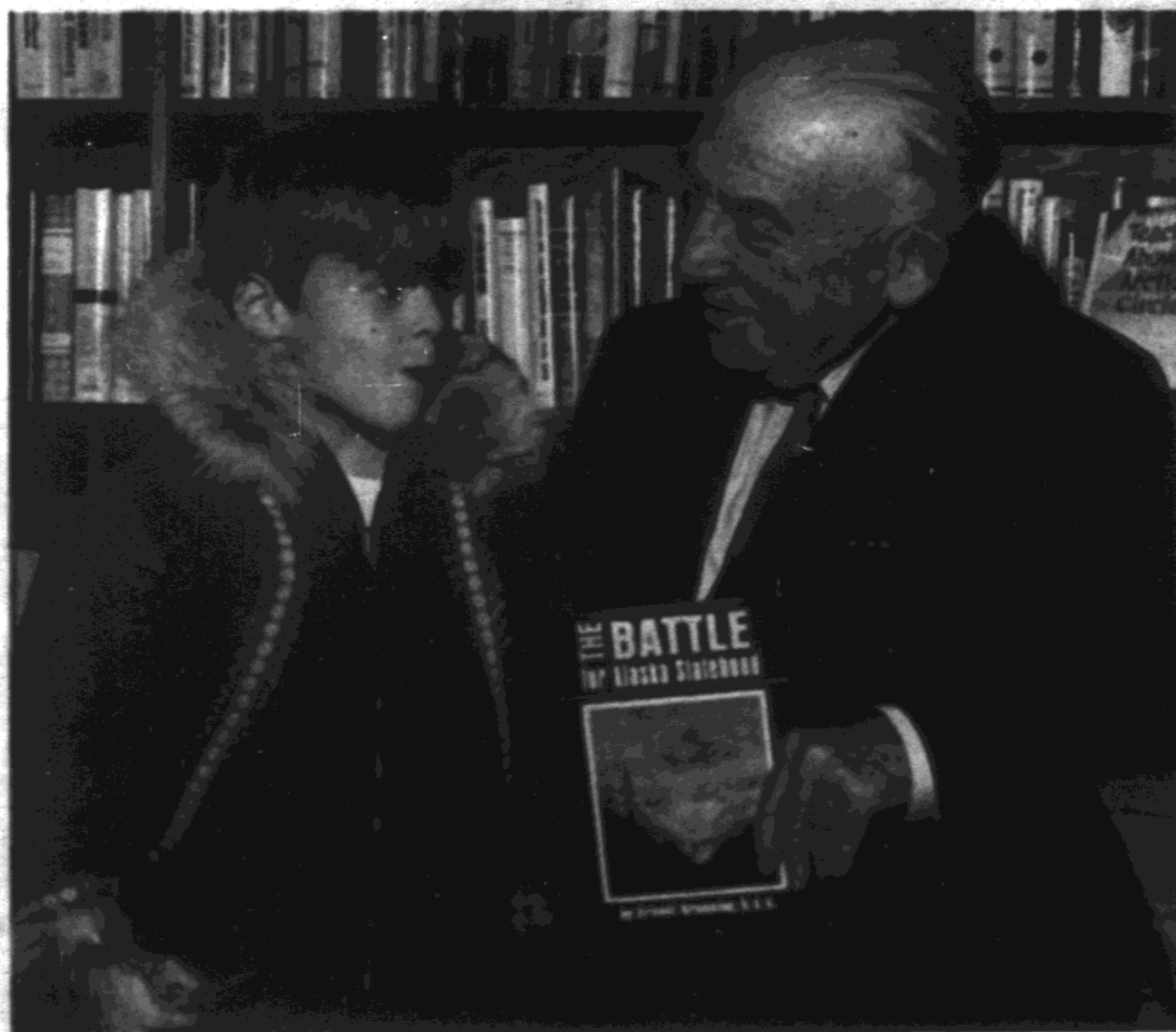


## Ernest Gruening has a dream for Alaska...



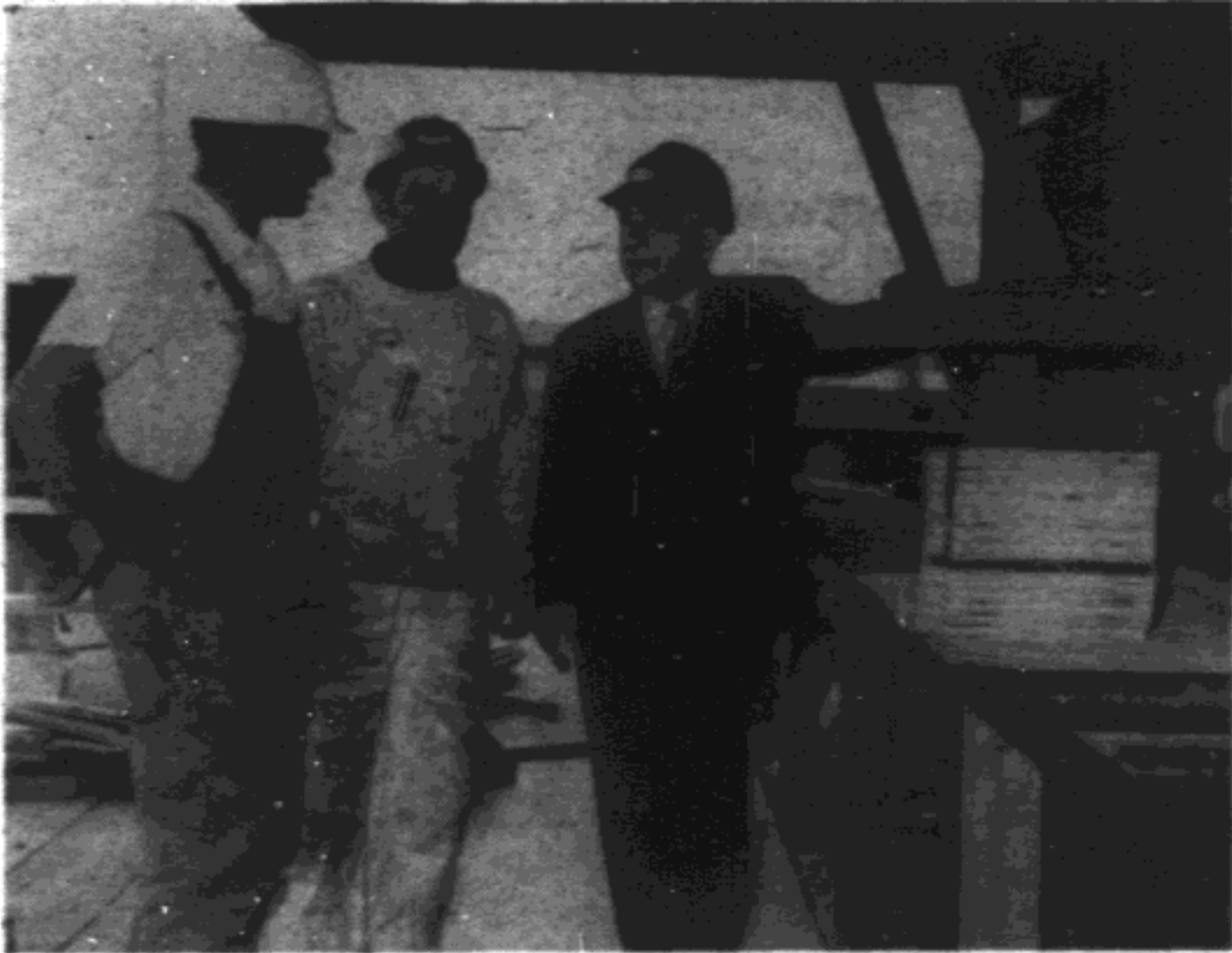

## and he works hard to make it come true

He dreams of — and works toward — the time when Alaska takes its rightful place in the first rank of the States. He dreams of — and works toward — the time when the grandeur of Alaska's natural beauty is matched by its wealth of opportunity for Alaskans.

As a man of action, Senator Gruening knows that it takes hard work to make a dream come true. He knows that educational opportunity is the basic ingredient of Alaskan economic growth. He knows that Alaskan industry and initiative must be reinforced by a fair share of Federal assistance and public works programs.

Alaska already has many enduring monuments to Senator Gruening's ability and farsightedness. Among them are the following programs which he obtained for Alaska:

Veterans' Home Loan ceilings have been raised from \$17,500 to \$25,000.

Alaska's handicapped children now receive \$100,000 annually in Federal educational assistance rather than \$20,000.

Alaskan miners now receive liberalized tax deductions for exploration and assistance for development work.

There are many others. Thanks to Senator Gruening's work, handicapped children get bigger allowances, federal funds for highway and harbor construction have been increased, Federal employees have kept their 25 per cent cost of living allowance and have won other protection as well.

Everyone remembers how Senator Gruening helped Alaska get Federal aid after the earthquake and the flood. And the farmers have benefited too, because now the Department of Defense makes considerable effort to purchase as much milk and produce as possible in Alaska.

But Senator Gruening knows also that much remains to be done — and he knows how to accomplish what's needed. He is working now on a far-reaching, practical program for Alaska progress.

In a recent book on our national government, author Stewart Alsop rated Gruening as one of a handful of "very able" Senators.

No one who knows of Senator Gruening's record and accomplishments is surprised by the rating. It is the latest in a long list of tangible proofs of the esteem in which he is held by our national leaders.

## Gruening the Senator

Students of the Congress often rate a legislator's worth by the committee assignments he receives. They know that the efficient and effective Senators get the vital assignments. By this rating, Ernest Gruening ranks high indeed.

He sits on three major Senate committees: Interior and Insular Affairs, Public Works and Government Operations. He is chairman of three important subcommittees, all of which directly bear on Alaskan interests.

As Chairman of the Minerals, Materials and Fuels Subcommittee, Senator Gruening secured the passage of legislation liberalizing tax deductions for mining exploration expenditures. As the newly appointed Chairman of the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Senator Gruening is in an excellent position to press for the rapid economic development of all of Alaska. As Chairman of the Subcommittee on Foreign Aid Expenditures he obtained the passage by the Senate of his bill giving State surplus property agencies priority over foreign countries in the selection of excess Federal property.

But Committee work is only part of the Gruening story. Ernest Gruening believes in direct action on Alaska's and the nation's behalf. He keeps in close contact with Federal agencies to keep Alaska projects moving. His expertise and wisdom are valued at the White House and by his colleagues in the Senate. And, of course, his experience and knowledge help to shape the legislation considered on the floor of the Senate.

All of this combines to make Senator Gruening a uniquely valuable representative in Washington of Alaska's needs and aspirations.
