NYU Psychology Dept. Recruiting Minorities with B.A. Degrees

The Department of Psychology of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at the New York University has launched a program to recruit interested members of the minority groups in the country.

The psychology department intends to accept Indians, Eskimos, Aleuts and other minority group members, over and above the regular quotas. The standards will be flexible and meaningful academic help will be given where needed.

The proposal was communicated to William Byler, executive director of the Association on American Indian Affairs in New York by Richard J. Koppenaal, Associate Professor of Psychology at the New York University.

"At this time," Koppenaal said, "it is not possible to make any promises, but serious efforts will be made to provide financial help at a level which would enable full-time study."

The department offers degrees, primarily the Ph. D., in experimental, social, personality, community mental health, clinical and industrial phychology.

"We are interested in taking students for this fall as well as for next year," said Koppanaal.
