The children work just as hard here as any other village, and I can't think of one high school girl who runs around with a G.I. We provide other activities for our children but we need facilities!!!

Galena has access to planes everyday and a good air port, which is another good reason to put Galena on top of the priority list for a new school. We have a PHS Registered Nurse and a good clinic here, which is an advantage and a necessity for any school. These are just two of many good reasons to put a school in Galena.

Galena is always cut off of programs, such as the Bi-Lingual Aides, Teacher Aides, and Headstart, becuase our income is too high. Why don't they spend some of the high taxes we pay in our own community?? That's what we are all working and paying taxes for—to better ourselves, our families, our community, state, and nation. Our community, Galena, doesn't seem to be get-

ting any of the benefits.

We're all trying hard to clean our reputation and provide activities for our children to keep them from drinking, etc., but above all, we need a new school and gymansium!!! "God helps those who help themselves," and believe me we are working to help ourselves and Galena!!!!!!
