Currently the chair of the Alaska Native Women's Commission, Sally is also a member of the Chatham School District board.

The Angoon Market Center is staffed by Al and Sally's many children and numerous nieces and nephews. The pride in ownership of a local small business must be contagious, because these young people have done a great job of serving the customers and caring for the new store. And it didn't hurt to have as the store's manager, Jaeleen Kookesh, their daughter and a full-time student at Stanford University. 
With Jaeleen returning to Stanford this fall, the door is now open for another of Al and Sally's children to develop their
