Special provisions of the tax law enable taxpayers located in the coastal towns in northwestern Alaska from Hooper Bay to Kot-zebue, declared disaster areas by the President on November 14, 1974, to deduct disaster-related casualty losses on either the current year's return or that of the preceding year by filing Form 1040X, amended return.

The law covers losses of business property, as well as per-sonal property, and extends to taxpayers who use either a fiscalyear or calendar-year basis to file their tax return. Non-business losses are limited to the amount over \$100 for each casualty.

"A list of items lost or damag-A list of items lost of damaged, showing initial cost, value immediately before the loss occurred, is recommended," Mr. Roddy said. "Photos of damaged property are very helpful, as are appraisals of damage to property that must be repaired before making a

Taxpayers who need help in preparing their returns or making a claim for refund can call their local IRS office or send a postcard requesting a free copy of IRS publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses and Thefts."

This winter Sheldon will be missing temperatures that frequently fall to 40 below zero and at times have slide to a wind-chill factor of 120 below. He is not missing that, but he is missing a hobby and also a job – hunting. That's been one of his jobs for years and helped earn him college funds this summer in addition to serving as a tourist guide to the isolated village. Sheldon also admits the whale
