Now majoring in music education Sheldon says he picked George Fox because of its "strong music program and Christian emphasis" and has found another bonus here young people his age.

In Kotzebue where his father is a power plant operator and his family helps hunt and fish for food, Sheldon did not have the company of as many friends his age as he is finding now where he is surrounded by 480 nearly his age.
