the army in Japan, made a diagnosis by short wave radio. A school teacher in Alaska was appealing for medical advice on a ham radio circuit. Dr. McCarroll got the messageon the child's condition. and diagnosed the illness as penumonia. He prescribed penicillin. The remote village had some of the medicine and later a postcard from Elim, Alaska arrived in the Army's Kuma Station, Hokkaido, Japan, saying the

baby "is doing fine."
