Governor Offers Sympathy To Parents of Chas. Ned

Governor William A. Egan has received word that the Lakes Region Sted Dog Club of New Hampshire has voted unanimously to create a perpetual trophy named for Charles Ned, 21-year-old Allekaket sled dog musher and handler who drowned on October 27 of this year when his dog team broke through the ce of the Alacha River.

Mrs. Cynthia J. Molburg, the club's secretary, wrote the Governor the Charles Ned trophy would be awarded annually to the best dog handler in the Laconia World Championship Sled Dog Derby.

Ned and musher Jerry Riley of Nensna became known to New England dog sled racing groups last year when they became the first native Alaskan mushers to compete in that area of the Nation.

"While Jerry was gamering racing laurels for the State of Alaska, Charlie was quietly performing his duties as handler, and I might add that in this capacity no one was his equal." Mrs. Molburg wrote "While acting in this subordinate position, he made in more friends for the State of Alaska than the people of that State will ever realize. Charlie was in the truest sense of the word a one-man embassy. His wonderful smile and outgoing personality had its lasting effect on the very young and very old alike.

"It was with great

sadness that we learned of Charlie's tragic death... This club does not bestow honors on whims, but in the brief time that Charlie had been among us he had added something to the very thing that has brought this group together, the training and racing sether.

"He had made us more consciously aware of the beauty of working with dogs in an era when machines threaten to deny man the dignity of being master of his destiny.

Ned is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Simon Ned, a brother, Freddie; and a sieter, Francis. All are of Allakaket.
