

The tickets are available now to allow Alaskans to place their bets on the minute, date and hour that the ice will move, signaling the start of spring. Bets may be placed until midnight, April 6, when the compilation of bets and the long waiting begins.

Nenana Ice Classic

A further movement of 90 feet will stop the clock and the 1976 Nenana Ice Classic will have a new winner or group of winners. Tickets for the Classic can be purchased throughout the state until April 5, when betting will close and waiting will begin.

Every bet is posted and then the long wait begins. Chances are, the ice will go out some time in April or May. Every system of guessing the right times has been tried, even computers, but everyone might as well stick to one system—keep your fingers crossed.
