Canada's first Native owned casting system will go on the air and operated television broadon Oct. 24.

Approval was given on July 27 for the network, called the

Inuit Broadcasting Corp. (IBC), to go on the air next month.

The station is owned and operated by Canada's Inuit. The station will use the transponders of the Anik-B satellite. Signals will be received in the Baffin. Keewatin and Central Arctic districts of the Northwest Territories.
