

Six students receive scholarships from CIRI

Six college students recently received scholarships for the 1982 fall semester from Cook Inlet Region, Inc. ("CIRI").

CIRI, one of the 13 regional corporations established by the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, has two scholarship programs that it administers on behalf of its shareholders.

Jeri E. Taeschner is winner

of one of the CIRI-H&N \$500 scholarships being offered for a second year. Taeschner is attending Hawaii Pacific College where she is majoring in business administration with a concentration in Travel Industry Management. Her career goal is to work for an airline company. She grew up on the Kenai Peninsula in Alaska

until she moved to Honolulu, Hawaii where she now resides.

CIRI-H&N is a joint venture of CIRI and Holmes and Narver, Inc., an engineering, architectural, construction and maintenance company. The joint venture had previous camp construction contracts during the construction of the Alyeska oil pipeline and the building of Watana Camp at the proposed site of the Susitna Hydroelectric Dam about 160 miles north of Anchorage.

Scholarships from the CIRI/ARCO Scholarship program

have been awarded to five CIRI shareholders. Four of these students are enrolled in business administration undergraduates programs, and one student is studying petroleum technology. Recipients of these awards were Alice R. Evern, Mona K. Haldane, Cheryl K. Kalerak, Kristin C. Davis and Tim Shaginoff.

Evern is a senior at Linfield College (McMinnville, Oregon) where she is enrolled in an undergraduate degree in secondary education, studying mathematics and art. She anticipates completing the pro-

gram and earning an elementary education certificate in order to fulfill her goal of teaching in rural Alaska. Evern is from Anchorage.

Haldane also is attending Linfield College where she is majoring in business administration. Her area of concentration is marketing. She recently was accepted into the semester study abroad program in Paris, France, sponsored by Linfield College. She plans to enter the business/marketing profession.

Beginning a four-year business marketing and management program this fall at the University of Washington, Kalerak hopes to become a manager in Safeway, Inc., a company for whom she currently works while attending college.

Davis is a freshman at the University of Arizona where she is majoring in business administration with additional coursework in engineering. Upon completion of her degree she hopes to be able to work for one of the settlement act corporations such as CIRI.

Tim Shaginoff entered Kenai Community College this fall where he is enrolled in petroleum technology. He resides with his family in Kenai, Alaska.

The CIRI/ARCO Scholarship program is offered on a "matching funds" basis by CIRI and ARCO Alaska, Inc. This is the first time this program has been offered.
