## **Bison Hunting**

Applications for two permit bison hunts to be held in the Interior this year are now avail-able at Alaska Department of Fish and Game offices in Fair-Fist and Game others in Fair-banks, Anchorage, Delta Junc-tion, Tok, McGrath, Glennallen and Juneau, according to Mel Buchholtz, game biologist, Alas-ka Department of Fish and Game, Fairbanks. As in the past, a hunt will be directly unconsided by Fish and

directly supervised by Fish and Game personnel for 35 bison at Delta from Sept. 23 through Sept. 29.

The second hunt will be conducted in the Farewell herd lo-cated near McGrath for 10 animals. Dates of the Farewell hunt extend from Sept. 21 through Sept. 30. Unlike the Delta hunt, Fish

and Game personnel will not accompany hunters at Farewell.

accompany hunters at Farewell. Two major changes in the regulations. this year are the re-quirements that all applicants, 16 years of age or older, must purchase a hunting license be-fore applying, and the prohibi-tion of hunting bison the same day a person is airborne. In addition, those persons

In addition, those persons In addition, those persons who took a bison on any hunt after July 1, 1970 are not eligi-ble to apply. Applicants are re-stricted to applying for only one of these two hunts. A public drawing will be held in angle. Sentember in Esithapts.

in early September in Fairbanks for both hunts.




