I enjoyed your copies of Tundra Times last year and would like to receive it again. I am enclosing six dollars in bills because I am not certain how much trouble a check would be.

Last year my boys and girls corresponded with Mr. Wall's boys and girls in the BIA school at Chevak and they really enjoyed writing and receiving letters. The Chevak children are real artists, and sent crayon pictures as well as letters. They also sent a doll dressed in furs, and an Eskimo Yo-yo and a beautiful grass basket. Some of these the mothers made to send to us.

This year of course I have a new group of boys and girls. They wrote letters and have not heard from them. One morning when I turned on my TV to the Today show a newscaster was telling about an

airlift of 650 Eskimos—I thought he said because of high water. Where this was I have not found out. But right away of course one thinks of the villages near the west coast, and I cannot help wondering whether they are still there or moved inland. We don't get much news from Alaska down here.

Our weather report lists temperatures in other cities, and usually includes the reading at Anchorage. It has been colder there most of the fall than here, but now the temps
