Lady Laraux of Bethel who last year won the Howard Rock Trophy for best all around athlete, and one of Pickett's major competitors in the recent Arctic Winter Games, also will be on hand to provide Pickett with competition.

Other traditional events include the muktak eating contest, the seal skinning and fish cutting competitions, the sewing contest, log rolling, Native Baby contest, Native dancing and the Miss World Eskimo Indian Olympics Queen contest.
