The Catholic grade school in Fairbanks was built in 1951. Lefore its construction, classes were held in the basement of the Immaculate Conception church, fondly called "the little church" by parishoners.

When students were graduated from the 8th grade, they began high school in the "little church" basement and moved to the present Monroe High School upon its completion in 1956.

During Bishop Gleeson's 25 years of loving work in Alaska, practically every mission in Alas-

ka had been rebuilt and new ones added.

One area after another re-ceived his care and attention: from St. Mary's, Tununak, from St. Mary's, Tununas, Alakanak, Emmonak, Nenana, Delta, Glenallen,

He gave the first lay school board in Fairbanks its charter with full responsibility. Voluntarily, Bishop Gleeson turned over the leadership to a younger Bishop successor. Robert Whelan.

Realignment of **BIA** Functions

Secretary of the Interior Rogers C. B. Morton announced a realignment of the central office functions and responsibili-ties of the Bureau of Indian Attairs

Secretary Morton said that the President, in his human rethe rresident, in his human resources message to Congress on March 1, 1973, directed that steps be taken to transfer day-to-day operational activities of the Bureau from Washington to field offices

"The order being announced provides for the first stage of organizational changes in the Bureau and authorizes immediate staffing of key positions in order to implement the Presi-dent's directive, reduce non-essential Central Office support essential Central Office support staff and increase the effective-ness of the delivery system of services to Indians," Secretary Morton said.


To assist in fulfilling the President's directive, Secretary Morton has designated an assistant secretarial steering committee composed of the Assistant Secretary for Management, the Asst. Sec or Program Development and Budget, the Asst. to the Sec. for Indian Af-fairs and the Solicitor together with a working group to review and make recommendations to him on a complete reorganization of the entire Bureau of Indian Af-

Under the realignment, the Bureau will be headed by a Commissioner of Indian Affairs, re-porting directly to the Secretary and a Duputy Commissioner. Until these positions are fill-

ed, their duties will be performed by the Assistant to the Secretary for Indian Affairs Marvin Franklin and the Deputy Assist-ant Secretary of the Interior (Indian Affairs) William Rogers.

Included in the Central Office organization will be six major offices: Indian Education Programs; Tribal Resource Development: Trust Responsibilities; Indian Services; Fablic Affairs:
