Recovers \$172,000

"The Consumer Protection Section recovered over \$172,000 for consumers last year." an-nounced Attorney General Norman C. Gorsuch today. The figure was taken from

the Program's Annual Report for the 1974 Fiscal Year. This per-iod covers July 1, 1973 through June 30, 1974.

The monetary recovery repre-sents an increase of 200% over the previous fiscal year when \$56,451 were recovered for the Alaskan consumers by the program.

gram. The number of contacts made by consumers to the program's "three offices doubled during the same period from 2,700 in 1973 to 5,759 in 1974. A total of 1,198 formal complaints were filed with the office, and it was from these complaints that the percoveries were obtained

recoveries were obtained. "These figures represent a dramatic increase in activity dur-ing the past fiscal year," stated Gorsuch, "as well as an increas-ing awareness on the part of the consumer in Aleka that the consumer in Alaska that the Consumer Protection Section is there to help them with any difficulties that arise.

The Consumer Protection Section operates out of the office of the Attorney General to provide information on consumer topics and protection for the consumer from unfair trade practices

His limp apparent-ly did not handicap him too much in his younger days, but it was revealed when he grew old that he had endured great wain all through his hunting life life.

He was an inspiration to many a young hunter. Even un-der the handicap, Samaroona's endurance was tremendous. His ability to take seals, oogruk, walrus, foxes, wolverines, wolves polar bears, and the great bow-head whales stood out among his fellow hunters.

Treasured Memories

The memory of Samaroona has been a comfort through the years. To have known him has been a privilege and an honor. As far as this writer is concerned, he was a great man. The toys bows and arrows, legends, and many, many, kindnesses Sama-roona had shown him are treasmemories. ured

His serenity was a steadying force in his village. He was a great link to the past through his fabulous knowledge of legends. His selflessness and gen-erosity was a boon. His contribution to the village's existence


