## Praised for Work on Indian Health

Dr. Emery A. Johnson, Assistant Surgeon General and Director, Indian Health Service, has been awarded the Public Health Service Distinguished Service Medal for "outstanding accomp-lishments and leadership in the management and operation of the Indian Health Service—which the Indian Health Service—which have resulted in significantly elevating the health of the American Indian and Alaska Native populations."

The Indian Health Service is responsible for the health care of 475,000 Indians, Eskimos and Aleuts living in 24 States.

The award was made by PHS Surgeon General, Jesse L. Steinfeld and presented by Health, Education, and Welfare Secretary Elliot L. Richardson at De partmental ceremonies at the Sopartmental ceremonies at the So-cial Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland, Thursday afternoon, April 13.

Dr. Johnson has served as Director of the Indian Health Service since November 1969, his appointment. culminating

his appointment culminating

his appointment culminating many years' experience in the Indian health program.

Dr. Johnson joined the Indian Health Service in 1955 as a medical officer at the PHS Indian Hospital, White Earth, Minnesota.

He subsequently served as medical officer in charge of PHS

He subsequently served as medical officer in charge of PHS Indian hospitals at White Earth and Winnebago, Nebraska and Phoenix, Arizona; as Deputy Indian Health Area Director in Phoeniz; and Area Director

in Phoeniz; and Area Director in Billings, Montana. In June 1966 he was ap-pointed Assistant Director and Chief, Office of Program Services of the entire Indian Health Service, moving up to Deputy Director in 1967.

Dr. Johnson was born in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, Ap-ril 16, 1929. He took his B.S.

Military Surgeons.

In 1966 he was awarded the Public Health Service Commendation Medal and in 1971, the Meritorious Service Medal of the Public Health Service.
