Was Johnson held a State Dinner recently in honor of His Excellency, The President of the Republic of Upper Volta and Mrs. Maurice Yameogo,

The distinguished visitors were r ceived by the President and Mrs. Johnson upstairs in the Yellow Oval Room Colors were presented at the foot of the Grand Stairway and guests were received in the East room The Marine Band provided background music in the foyer.

Dinner was served in the State Dining Room and guests were seated at ten round tables and a head table. The menu was:

Roast Sirloin White House, Rissole potatoes tomatoes with mushrooms, Salad Mimosa, Brie cheese, and Glace Yameogo.

Flowers in the centerpieces included:

Gladiolus tristus (Sweet Glad) blue and white Delphinium, blue Bachelor's-Buttons, Gypsophila, red and white carnations, candytuft, Bachelor's Buttons, Gypsophila red and white carnations, candytuft, blue, yellow and white Iris, bronze, yellow and white Chrysanthemums. The Truman china was used along with Vermeil flatware.

The U.S. Army strings played during dessert.
Following dinner a group of 35 American Indian student dancers, representing 14 tribes from the Interesting of American Indian Arts in stitute of American Indian Arts in

Santa Fe, New Mexico, entertained at theater-in-the-round arrangement in the East Room. This was the first time that American Indians have provided entertainment at dinner in the White House.
