

Television is going into remote Alaska villages, but it's not the usual kind of television.

An experimental program, to help rural elementary school teachers evaluate teaching techniques by viewing themselves on television is being aided by the University of Alaska's Rural School Project.

William R. Filter, audiovisual coordinator for the project, will undertake the second of three trips to remote villages November 24.

He and Dr. Paul Jenson of the Corvallis, Ore. public school system, will visit Ekwok, New Stuyahok and Kolignik on the Nushagak River near Dillingham in Southwestern Alaska.

The trip will last 10 days. The two educators will videotape five teachers in class session with village children.

A previous trip to the same villages produced nine tapes taken in classes. After each filming, the teachers were able to watch themselves on the television screen, "seeing themselves as others see them in class," Filter said.
