Council, and vice-president of
the Alaska Native Commission
on Alcohol and Drug Abuse.
I also am a member of several
fraternal organizations.

Why do I want to run? Because I am concerned about the long range implications of Echo Cove development, concerned about the "Lemon Creek affair," concerned about the shareholder hire policy on the Goldbelt building, concerned about the "closed shop" attitude of the Board of Directors - one in which no room is made for shareholders who seek a seat on the Board. This year they did not bother to ask for candidates to the Board, they have structured the proxy card so that it does not allow for write-in candidates.

If these and other issues concern you, I then offer you this pledge: I am independent, I owe favors to no one and will act accordingly. My responsibility is to work in your behalf, not mine. Examine the issues, weigh qualifications, and vote. You may use the attached form to vote and this will constitute a legal proxy. This is an independent Goldbelt Proxy solicitation.

These proxies will be solicited in person, by mail or by public meeting. The cost will be borne by the candidate and not exceed \$500. Nothing has been spent to date. My committee is composed of my mother, Mary Cesar, 5959 Sunset; Alice Vavalis, Cedar Park; and Eleanor David, Gruening Park, as well as many friends. Reimbursement of expenses, if successful, will be sought.

Reason why we aren't getting much money now is because all our damn money is being spent buying things that will make us more money, pretty soon. That is what the big shots running our corporations call Developmental Growing, or one of the things necessary in the stages of economic development, or making money. It's really true.
