mittee composed of a member from each of the regional cor-porations met earlier in the month and selected Jackson as their number one priority selec-tion to fill the newly-created position position was created by The The position was created by the passage of a resolution dur-ing the Annual Alaska Federa-tion of Natives Convention to separate Land Claims Adminis-tration and Human Resources Programs to make each more re-

sponsive and effective Land Claims Administration will deal with the many prob-lems regarding the implementa-tion-of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act.

The new Human Resources vice president will provide staff support to the Human Resources Committee and be responsible for supervision of AFN Human Resources Programs in the fields of Education, Health, and Training and Technical Assistance.

Jackson, 28, is originally from Kake, Alaska and is a graduate of the University of Alaska. Dur-ing the past few years he has worked as a program developer for the Rural Alaska Community for the Rural Alaska Community Action Program; executive di-rector, Southeast Alaska Com-munity Action Program; deputy director, State Rural Develop-ment Agency; and director; Johnson-O'Malley Program.

He is a member of a number of statewide boards and com-

mittees Jackson stated, "I am ex-tremely excited about moving into this new position. The position oversees all the Health, Ed-ucation, and other Human Re-sources Programs. Unlike other ucation, and other Human Re-sources Programs. Unlike other people," he said, "I consider the development of our human resources a high priority. It is our most valuable renewable re-source and should be developed. This area has not been given the attention it deserves. It will be my goal to advocate this area of development—it is a prerequisite to the development of any other resource within the regional corporations."
