Citizens Participating Conference

JUNEAU — The first session
of the Third Annual Citizens Participating Conference recently adjourned.

The delegates voted to return

to Juneau for the second session on April 8 through 12. The Citizens Participation

Conference is sponsored by the Division of State Economic Op-portunity of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs Its purpose is to bring 30 low-

income people representing all regions of the state to Juneau twice during the legislative session to learn how the state gov-

sion to learn how the state government functions and to voice the needs of their areas to legislators and key agency people.

Delegate Mike Zacharof of St. Paul was voted in as chairman of the CPC with John Monfor of Kenai as vice chairman. The delegates formed five committees in which they worked to discuss the legislation concerning their key issues and to draw up resolutions.

draw up resolutions.

The leadership was strong and the delegates worked well together. Several of them testified at legislative committee hearings and many were able to meet with legislators.

Chairman of the community Facilities Committee, John Goodwin of Kotzebue, said their main concern was for better business. housing.

John Monfor of Kenai, chairman of the Education Committee, expressed the most impor-tant needs as more village high schools and bilingual programs

More day care facilities, teen centers, and upgrading the AFDC payments were the main goals of the Social Services Committee chaired by Judith Adrian of Anchorage

Hjalmar Olson of Koliganek is chairman of the Resources Committee. They want the vil-lage people themselves to define subsistence so that their rights to hunt and fish will be guaran-teed, and are opposed to all tro-phy hunting for antlers and heads only which wastes huge heads only whice amounts of meat.

Better housing for the aged and a raise in the old age assist-ance payments from \$250 to \$350 per month were the issues backed by the Senior Citizens Committee headed by John Thomas of Anchorage.

Other educators of the conference included guest speakers Jack Chenoweth and Bill Pritchard of the Division of Local Government Assistance of the De-

partment of Community and Regional Affairs. Chenoweth explained the structure and functions of local government and Pritchard explained federal and state revenue

A film about the Bristol Bay fishery called "No More Fish" was shown along with a video-tape of the Subsistence Conference put on in Juneau by the

Land Use Planning Commission. When the delegates return for the second session in April, the conference as a whole will vote

conference as a whole will vote on all the committee resolutions and then present them to the appropriate legislators and agencies.

The delegates all felt that the CPC session was a good learning experience and expressed their appreciation for the concern and interest shown by the legislators.
