UA business education seminars

Seminars in business education
will be conducted in three rural
Alaska communities this spring
by the University of Alaska's
new Rural Educational Affairs
Division (READ).

Arctic Village hosted a one
credit hour class in small
business management concepts
on April 20-22, according to
Daphne Gustafson, project
coordinator.

The workshop was designed
with input from the principal
village corporation employees
and will cover the structure of
corporate organization and
management methods that are
essential to the development of
organizations in the formative
stage. Kotzebue will host a
READ management seminar for
rural city administrators on May
18-20. Participants may earn one
credit hour in political science.

The jurisdiction and operation
of second class cities will be
reviewed, and topics will include
legal documents, ordinances,
resolutions, motions, minutes,
risk management, insurance
requirements, budgeting, and
land records.

A third business education
workshop in administrative
management, is to be scheduled
in Fort Yukon in May. READ's
business seminar project has
been able to meet only a
fraction of the requests it has
received from villages
throughout Alaska due to
funding and equipment
limitations.

The project, which is partially
funded with monies from Title I
of the Higher Education Act of
1965, is geared to the immediate
business education needs of
village management created by
the Alaska Land Claims
Settlement Act.

Village corporations are to
begin independent management
of their assets in December 1976,
according to the Act.

Mrs. Gustafson develops
workshops that meet University
of Alaska requirements for
college credit, and lines up
instructors who are qualified to
teach the subjects that villagers
want to learn.

She coordinated the business
seminar project last year, and
was appointed to continue both
that project and the Village Art
Upgrade Program in February of
this year by Mrs. Elaine Ramos,
vice president of READ, after
the two projects were
transferred from the Division of
Continuing Education to READ.

Mrs. Gustafson is an Eskimo
from Haycock on the Seward
Peninsula. She attended high

school in Nome, received a
bachelor's degree from
Washington State University and
is working toward a master's
degree in business administration
at the University of Alaska.

Although she is busy helping
her husband, Ed, to start a new
construction business and to
care for their two-year-old
daughter, Sterling, Mrs.
Gustafson eagerly resumed her
work in rural education.

Twenty classes are in progress
in the popular Village Arts
Upgrade Program, which is now
in its fifth year. This project is
able to fulfill only about
one-fourth of the requests it
receives for classes and
workshops from rural areas of
the state.

Mrs. Gustafson has scheduled a
ceramics workshop in Tanana in
mid-April with Verne Sanford of
the University of Alaska Art
Department as its instructor.

Villagers were so enthused
about the first ceramics
workshop in Tanana last year
that they formed a ceramics club
that has been active throughout
the winter.

Other classes currently in
progress range from Athabaskan
sled building taught by Henry
Titus in Ruby, Pete Sereadlook's
class in soapstone and ivory
carving at Wales to a course in
spruce root basketry and Tlingit
beadwork taught by Annie
Lawrence in Hoonah.
