The people behind those leaders must also get behind Notti if he is to have a chance of getting elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. The desire to get him in should be there. If it is to become a positive action, the Native leaders must help their people to bring it out. This is an exceptional opportunity to get a Native person in the U.S. Congress.

We would also like to express our deep appreciation to Pegge Begich who threw in her crucial block of votes behind Emil Notti that vaulted him into the lead and nomination. This was a demonstration of unselfishness shown by the courageous little lady who sought to succeed her late husband Congressman Nick Begich unsuccessfully. She has shown us courage seldom demonstrated by human endeavor. We also like to express our appreciation to Chancy Croft for his timely announcement to fall behind Notti which could elect him to Congress. His action was crucial in unifying effect to get behind the nominee because Notti could meet potent opposition in Donald Young the Republican nominee for the late Nick Begich's seat in Congress.
