Poor Response On 'Over 65'

program to aid A State elderly citizens is getting poor response from the bush, and particularly from Alaska's Native villages.

The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare is curious as to why rural residents are reluctant to file under a new state law which grants \$100 a month to citizens over 65 who have lived in Alaska continuously for 25 years or more.

Last week 3,641 \$100 checks went out to "over 65" residents but few of them to villages. Rose Palmquist, program officer, said she was experiencing difficulty in getting people in rural communities to submit applications.

In Bethel, for example, only three applications were mitted. The state is now sending out more information on the program through bush magistrates, postmasters, and law law officers in remote areas.

There are several Native villages which have sent in no applications. Mrs. Palmquist is beginning to tour the bush in an effort to educate the public about the program.

Some reluctarize to apply may be based on confusions about how the grant would effect ongoing old age assistance, federal food stamp programs, and other agency help. Anyone having questions on the longevity bonus should contact the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare or ask their present caseworker.

In order to qualify, you must be over 65 and have lived in Alaska for 25 years of more.
