Washington - Two top federal officials have endorsed Alaskan Eskimo whalers' right to continue their subsistence whaling activities.

Department of the Interior Under Secretary James A. Joseph said Monday that both he and Interior Secretary Cecil D. Andrus "strongly support 'he subsistence hunting rights of Alaska Eskimos and other indigenous people."

"That position has been repeatedly made clear in the context of the subsistence bowhead hunt and the In-

terior Department has consistently been the Natives' staunchiest ally in the fight to guarantee and protect their subsistence whaling activities." Joseph said.

The U.S. Department of Justice is conducting an investigation into alleged violations of quotas set to limit the Eskimos' take of the endangered bowhead whales.

"We do not believe that the choice is between the eradication of a wild species, the whale, which would be lamentable: or in the disappearance of a vital culture - the Alaska Eski-

mos' - which would be a tragedy," Joseph siad.

"We believe the challenge. indeed the only sensible course, is to ensure the survival of both the species and the culture which relies to a great extent on a reasonable harvest of whates.
