Native Firefighters Die in Grash

The death of two firefighters Saturday night brought to five the number killed by the crash of a Bureau of Land Management chartered plane near Mo-Grath Friday.

Three, including the co-pilot

were killed on impact.

The aircraft, a DC-3, was carrying a 25-man Helitack crew from Stebbins to fight a fire north of Galena:

Inaugurated this year, the Helitack Operation is designed to place men and equipment at trouble spots within a short time by flying both to the site of the trouble.

The cause of the crash was initially listed as engine failure

Cyril Pete, brother of Edwig,

Roy Kirk, and co-pilot Michael A. Benna. The plane's pilot was taken to Elmendorf Air Force Base hospital with multiple fractures and

the rest of the firefighters to the Alaska Native Medical Center.
