## Bailey files for U.S. House

Norman Bailey, a 29 year old lifetime Alaskan resident filed today for the United States House of Representatives as a Democrat. Bailey, who expressed deep concern for the future of Alaska said,

"I believe Alaska's lone Congressman in Washington represents the image of Alaska in the U.S. House—he bears a heavy responsibility. It is my view that the incumbent has not effectively discharged that responsibility or, really reflects the image of most Alaskans.

He failed to exercise the good judgement Alaskans expected and deserved with the regard to the Watergate tragedy.

We are no closer now to a gas pipeline than when he arrived in Congress, despite the efforts of many hardworking Alaskans.

The impact of OCS leasing and development will soon be upon us—not only along the Gulf of Alaska near Yakutat and Cordova but in other areas where federal leases are planned.

A hodge-podge of competing proposals have been advanced by various interests in the "D-2" land selection issue. This complex issue, involving millions are acres and untold mineral potential is far from being resolved.

The various interests involved in an intense competition for our State's resource and mineral wealth have simply placed their cards on the table in the form of Legislation.

Alaska is still desperately fighting a continuing battle for true statehood. I believe that fight must be conducted in a clear and vigorous way, so that each and every Alaskan, not just a few special interests, may enjoy all the benefits our state has to offer. We must all work hard to preserve the spirit and uniqueness that is Alaska."

## Failure to enclose

A forgotten \$30 check has cost Rep. Jimmy Huntington of Galena his candidacy for reelection to the State House, Lt. Gov. Lowell Thomas Jr. said June 9.

Huntington, elected in 1974 as an Independent write-in candidate, failed to enclose the required filing fee when he made notice of his intent to run, Thomas said. That disqualifies him from appearing on the ballot.

Thomas said his office requested and received an opinion from the attorney general's office before telling Huntington he was disqualified.

"The law's very clear on that point. I called and told him the best option now would be another write-in campaign," Thomas said.

In addition, Thomas said, there are questions about the qualifications of "roughly a dozen" other candidates who filed for office. Most of them involve uncertainties about residency or party registration and should be cleared up "within the week, as soon as we possibly can," Thomas said. One U.S. House candidate and a State Senate hopeful from Anchorage are among the questioned candidates, he said.

Thomas said there are 77 Anchorage area resident among the 143 candidates statewide who have filed for State House

# Sally Smith files for State House

Sarah J. (Sally) Smith, 31, has announced her candidacy for the democratic nomination to the State House of Representatives.

Ms. Smith stated that the growth of Alaska government since oil has exceeded the checks and balances needed for responsible control.

Rather than assessing the true needs of the people, an enlarging central bureaucracy is interpreting statistics resulting in higher administrative costs and lower local delivery of services, Smith added.

Not only has the budget reached new high each year, increase supplemental appropriations have been made to agencies which have been overspent. She feels that it is time to take an active stand against these over expenditures, weed out some of the statistical padding and insure delivery of needed services with agency duplication.

Ms. Smith hopes that she would be known for quality legislation rather than quantity legislation. This quality could

include responsible amendment and repeal of some of the existing laws.

Smith served for two years as administrative assistant on

She has a Bachelor of Science degree in education from the University of Illinois, and has taught in Los Angeles, California, and substitute teacher in Fairbanks.

She has been an office manager for the Tundra Times, on the Alaskaland staff in 1970, Fairbanks Drama Association board of directors, former assistant director to the Young Alaskans, former choir director for the Presbyterian Church, and a volunteer for Tanana Valley Fair production.

This includes the administration, the present Title III Grant with the Federal Government and preparing necessary reports to the government while maintaining expenditures within project guidelines. The Director will also coordinate the development of the grant plan for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1976.

In addition, the Director administers State CETA Contracts that Mauneluk has with the State Manpower Division and other contracts or grants that Mauneluk has in the Manpower field.

DESIRED SKILLS: Administrative experience is desirable. Experience in federal programs especially in the Manpower and CETA area would be helpful.

seats. A total of 34 persons have announced for 10 Senate seats, 11 of them running in the Anchorage area. Six candidates have filed for the U.S. House seat; one of them is an Anchorage resident.

There were 179,876 Alaskans registered to vote as of June 1, the lieutenant governor said, a figure which he expects to surpass the 200,000 level before the November election because of interest in U.S. presidential elections. There were 170,065 persons registered to vote in 1974.

Voters must register at least 30 days before an election to be eligible to cast ballots in Alaska. Registration forms are available from any qualified registrar, or at the elections office at 211 East Fifteenth Ave.

Thomas said his office will make a special push to involve young voters in the coming elections. Only 44 per cent of the registered 18-19 year old
