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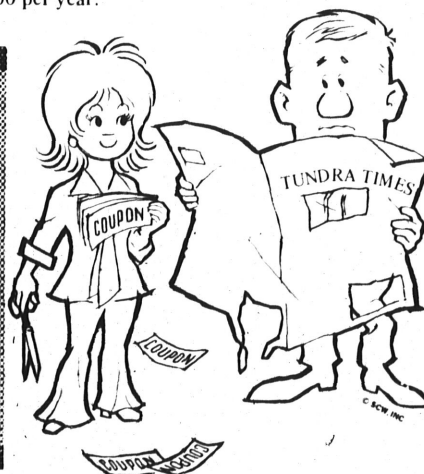
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The Now Washbasket

Although white nylon underthings have been on the market for many years, women still write in with this question: "How can I keep them white?"

By proper care nylons, the toughest of the man-made fabrics, not only can be kept white and fresh, but they can be re-whitened after they turn yellow.

First, wash them only with other white things. White nylons can readily pick up colors. Use warm to hot water and a gentle wash cycle with detergent and a borax additive, like Borateem, which deodorizes the garments and keeps them relatively odor free during the next wearing.

By comparison colored nylons should be washed in warm water, also at the gentle cycle setting. This will hold the colors fast.

A fabric softener in the rinse water will help eliminate the cling caused by static electricity.

Delicate, silk-like nylon blouses should be washed in warm water (120° F.), using a gentle cycle. Touch up ironing, if necessary, should be at a low temperature.

To return nylons to their original whiteness soak them in hot water, using a packaged color remover. And follow the directions on the package diligently.
