JUNEAU - Rep. Al Nakak, D-Nome, pre-filed a bill this session that would place a \$200,000 ceiling on Workmen's Compensation Death Benefits. Nakak said the bill will lower workmen's compensation rates which are now at the 45% level. For every \$100.000 an employer pays an employee he must pay \$45.00 for workmen's comp. "This has a direct bearing on the number of employees an employer may have and further has a very direct effect a business person will charge to his or her customers. The ultimate beneficiary of a lower workmen's compensation rate is the customer who pays a lower rate for the service. The only way that this rate can be lowered is by placing a ceiling on death benefits and \$200,000 is by no means a low benefit rate." Nakak said.

Nakak's amendment to the workmen's compensation bill does provide for the dependent widow or widower who is incapable of self-support to receive death benefits until their status changes or until death.

Of the bill, Nakak said, "The biggest problem that this alleviates is the fact that these rates are passed on to customers especially in several million dollar death benefit settlements."
